

Dear St Paul of the Cross Parishioners,

During our weekend Masses this month we are reminded that October is “Respect Life Month”. I presume that as Church-going Catholics we align ourselves fully with the Magisterium of the Church with regard to all life issues. God is the Giver of all life and as such, He alone is the ultimate arbiter of life and death decisions. We affirm with the universal Church that we respect life from natural conception to natural death.

During my doctoral studies, I surveyed Church-going Catholic students with regard to their attitude to abortion. As part of my course on public opinion I administered a questionnaire to 1,000 students at the University of Illinois at all Sunday Masses. To my total shock, I discovered that almost one-third of those students did not embrace totally the Church’s position. They subscribed to the opinion of mainstream American culture that maintains abortion to be a matter of choice rather than a matter of life. I guess that many young Catholics today align themselves more with popular opinion than with Church teaching.

Even though I am preaching to the choir, I would like to offer my thoughts on a couple of these issues. First of all, I am intrigued by the deep divisions that exist in our society with regard to these topics. Sometimes I am frustrated that the real substance is often confounded by rhetoric and semantics. Second, I believe that even well-meaning individuals sometimes fritter away their limited resources on futile enterprises instead of fighting battles that they can win. So much time and money are invested in trying to overturn Roe v Wade while the real battle should be conducted in the hearts of people.

First of all, all of us need to work towards a consistent moral perspective on life issues. There are people in our country who hug trees and protest product testing on animals but have no qualms of conscience over getting rid of a helpless human being. They refuse to wear fur and yet in their eyes the egg of a bald eagle is far more precious than a human fetus. These individuals will not allow their daughters to get a tattoo without their permission, but they object to laws that require parental notification in case of abortion. On the other side, there are certain individuals who fight abortion with all their might – and rightly so – and yet, they have no problem with the use of violence or war. They are also in favor of the death penalty. Sometimes they seem to say that the poor should fend for themselves or that the government should not come to the aid of the elderly or the disabled.

In order to have a consistent moral perspective we must renounce the temptation to play God and decide who deserves to live and who deserves to die. God alone should make that decision. We must protect unborn babies and at the same time find ways to take care of babies after birth. We should care for the elderly, the disabled and the physically and mentally challenged. We must work to establish what Pope John Paul II called “the culture of life.”

Second, in recent years many sincere Christians have spent huge amounts of money, time and energy to overturn Roe v Wade and they have not succeeded. I do believe that we must make every effort to change the law. However, I am also sadly aware that outlawing abortion is not going to stop it. I am convinced that the battle over abortion will not be won in the halls of Congress or in the chambers of justice. It will be won in the hearts of people.

We need to educate our young people that sexuality is a fragile gift that should be used within the context of married love. The gift comes with great responsibility. We need to tell our young people that adoption is a worthy choice. We need to convince parents and families that they should accept their children when “mistakes” happen and support them in difficult times. We need a comprehensive Christian education in chastity. I am of the opinion that many of our problems in marriage and relationships are closely tied to the carefree use of sexuality prior to marriage. In addition, we need also to help Catholics develop a personal spirituality. For without a strong spirituality and prayer life it is not possible for someone to accept and live the Christian ideals of chaste love proposed by the Church.

It would seem that the Catholic Church is the only world body that speaks boldly and unequivocally to defend the rights of the unborn, the elderly, the poor, the displaced and the marginalized. All the recent popes have been insistent on this unpopular stance of the Church. Not to be outdone, Pope Francis reiterated the teachings of his predecessors when he wrote the following in his Apostolic Exhortation, The Joy of the Gospel:

Among the vulnerable for whom the church wishes to care with particular love and concern are unborn children, the most defenseless and innocent among us. Nowadays efforts are made to deny them their human dignity and to do with them whatever one pleases, taking their lives and passing laws preventing anyone from standing in the way of this. ...Precisely because this involves the internal consistency of our message about the value of the human person, the church cannot be expected to change her position on this question... It is not ‘progressive’ to try to resolve problems by eliminating a human life...” (#213-214)

Let us pray for an end to abortion. Let us pray that the culture of life will flourish in our nation and in our world. Let us pray that every human being will be treated with dignity and respect, no matter who they are. Let us pray that every human person will be protected and cherished from natural conception to natural death. Let us do all in our power to promote the culture of life.

A LITTLE FAITH

Today our readings are about faith, frustration, and how much is enough. Habakkuk is a complainer having an argument with God. Timothy is encouraging a community challenged by cowardice and the apostles want more faith than they have. Things aren't happening fast enough for any of them or for us. All of them and we want God to do something sooner rather than later and we want God to give us a reason to believe that it will all work out. What does God do? God puts it back on them--and us--telling Habakkuk to describe the world he wants; telling the apostles to do more than the expected. Doing more with less is a familiar phrase today and a reminder that a little faith may be enough even for the most difficult times.



FIRE DRILL COMPLETED

Last Sunday the parish conducted its first-ever fire drill at the 9:00 AM Masses. We're happy to report that the drill was successful and represents an important completed step in our emergency planning.

In summary, the fire alarm was activated in the upper and lower churches at 9:55 AM. Approximately 450 parishioners were safely evacuated from the building in less than 2 minutes. Exiting parishioners moved clear of the building quickly and orderly.

Individuals with mobility challenges were given special assistance by ushers and volunteers.

We would like to especially thank all parishioners who participated in the drill, the 30+ ushers and volunteers who provided assistance with the drill, our priests, deacons and altar servers, the Park Ridge fire and police departments, and Archdiocese representatives. This couldn't have been done without you!

Future plans call for a fire drill at another Mass and further refinements to our Emergency Plan.



PARISH NURSE NOTES.....

Howdy!

I read labels and have done so for a long time. I surmise that many folks have and still do read labels, and may at times, wonder what some of the unfamiliar ingredients are and why they're there. So, here's a look at some.....**Xylitol** is a sugar free sweetener that we see in chewing gum and some "packaged sweeteners" and in some other sugar free foods. It's a sugar alcohol, the sweetest sugar alcohol. The body doesn't absorb xylitol so the calories contained are low. It doesn't promote tooth decay, but may, in larger amounts, promote diarrhea in some people. While it's basically not harmful to people it can be fatal to a dog. Several sticks of xylitol-containing-chewing-gum can cause death in a dog because it's absorbed quickly in a dog's bloodstream. This causes a very strong insulin response which can create a dramatic drop in the dog's blood sugar and do so quickly. As if this isn't enough, xylitol can cause fatal liver disease in dogs, so if there's a pooch in the home it's best to keep xylitol containing gum, food etc. secure and safe from an unsuspecting dog with a sweet tooth.

If you enjoy pickles, fruit juice or carbonated beverages, you may have ingested **sodium benzoate**, a preservative, which helps to prevent microorganisms from growing in acidic foods. *Sodium benzoate* occurs in plants and appears to be safe for many folks but can cause hives or asthma, (or other reactions), in sensitive people. A concern here can occur if *sodium benzoate* is used in beverages containing vitamin C. In an acidic solution, the two substances, (vitamin C and sodium benzoate), can "react together to form small amounts of benzene, a known cancer causative, (or carcinogen)". The amount of *benzene* produced is usually quite small and therefore, less risky, but several beverage companies reformulated some of their products to further reduce any risk of *benzene* production.

"**Monk fruit extract**" is a sweetener that is about 200 times sweeter than sugar. It's used to replace some or all of the added sugar in many foods and drinks. The *Monk fruit* has been consumed in China for many years while also being used more recently as an herbal medicine. The extract of monk fruit contains several highly sweet substances called mogrosides. One company using this in a product that contains 50 percent mogroside V, states that it's in a highly pure form, (and the product is therefore, quite sweet). But, we are advised that we should not think that we are consuming any whole fruit despite labeling that states *monk fruit* as an ingredient. The manufacturer, during processing, extracts and uses predominately the very sweet mogrosides.

Aloe vera is sold as a skin care product and can be quite effective here. It's also added to desserts, beverages, yogurt and used as a flavoring agent. Taken as a juice it may cause cramps and diarrhea. People with diabetes who use glucose lowering drugs should be cautious about taking aloe vera by mouth as it may lower blood sugar levels further. As well it's thought that ingested aloe vera may decrease the absorption of other drugs. In some testing with mice and rats, there were cancers noted but this is controversial as are the reports of some people experiencing hepatitis after ingesting aloe vera. If ingesting it, please check if it was filtered via a charcoal filtration process, thereby removing some of the controversial ingredients of aloe vera.

Annatto is a natural coloring agent of butter, cheese and other foods. It comes from the seeds of a tropical shrub and it's "hue" is yellow/orange. It can cause hives in some people and it's thought that there may be a higher amount of folks who have allergic reactions to it, than is commonly thought. (It's thought that perhaps annatto may cause as many or more allergic reactions than do synthetic food dyes). Till next week let's remember that, "good for the body is the work of the body, good for the soul is the work of the soul, and good for either the work of the other.

PERPETUAL EUCHARISTIC ADORATION CHAPEL

OUR BLESSED MOTHER AND THE CHAPEL

During the month of October, the Church honors our Blessed Mother and the Rosary. On October 7th we celebrate the Solemnity of Our Lady of the Rosary.

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC)* explains the how and why of Mary's place in the mystery of the Church.

“The Virgin Mary is acknowledged and honored as being truly the Mother of God and of the Redeemer. Mary’s role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it. In a wholly singular way, she cooperated by her obedience, faith, hope and burning charity in the Savior’s work of restoring supernatural life to souls. For this reason, she is a mother to us in the order of grace. The Church’s devotion to the Blessed Virgin is intrinsic to Christian worship and to whose protection the faithful fly in all their dangers and needs. This very special devotion differs essentially from the adoration which is given to the Incarnate Word.” (963,964,968,971)

St. Padre Pio advises us, “Always stay close to this heavenly mother, because she is the sea to be crossed to reach the shores of eternal splendor.”

In our Eucharistic Adoration Chapel, adorers find solace as they pray to our Blessed Mother for her intercession with her Son during times of depression, dangers, doubts, temptations and other troubles. Looking at the Sacred White Host in the Monstrance, adorers search for help in their plea to Jesus. We know that the love between Jesus and His Mother is more than we can ever imagine. Thus, when praying to Mary for her intercession, we know our petitions will be carried by this remarkable love between Mother and Son.


