





LETTERS FROM A PASTOR TO HIS PEOPLE



Dear Parishioners,

I was texted a video the other day of my four-year-old nephew Sebastian explaining what a crucifix was and why the soldiers nailed Jesus to the cross. Sebbie is very intrigued by the Catholic faith and apparently, like his uncle, enjoys teaching it to others.

The video was adorable and I found myself laughing as Sebbie was making some creative claims (also like his uncle). "The cwoosifix had to be weighed so Jesus didn't fall over," said Sebbie, pointing to the base. And, then, indicating upwards, "the soldiers put Jesus' head down so it would be easier."

As I prayed over Jesus' gesture and words in this Gospel, I thought about Sebbie. "Taking a child, Jesus placed it in their midst, and putting his arms around it, he said to them, 'Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me'" (Mark 9:36-37).

Maybe there is something I can learn from my little nephew. Sebbie's discourse on the "cwoosifix" is not something to just find cute and funny, but something to actually *receive*. Jesus tells us to *receive* children, and thereby receive him; that is, listen to children and take them seriously.

Sebbie wasn't afraid of the crucifix. He wasn't repulsed by Jesus' death. In fact, the video was taken in a cemetery, which is adjacent to Sebbie's school. They were walking through the cemetery looking at the monuments and crosses. Sebbie was okay with this.

The adult disciples, on the other hand, were scared away by the prospect of Jesus' death. "They were afraid to question him," (Mark 9:32) when Jesus talked about being crucified. A child does not shy away from the cross. Nor should we.

The disciples, as they were walking with Jesus, argued amongst themselves about who was the greatest. Sebbie was simply talking about Jesus and the crosses (and "Mother Mary," as he says). He wasn't arguing with his older brother Luke, aged 7, about who was smarter or more beloved. Little children don't care about status. They keep their eyes on Jesus. So should we.

Finally, the disciples watch Jesus put his arms lovingly around a child. They see Jesus delight in the simplicity

and purity of the boy/girl. Sebbie might not have felt it, and the video couldn't capture it, but he was being hugged by Jesus there. Jesus says on another occasion, "See that you despise not one of these little ones; for I say unto you, that in heaven their angels always behold the face of my Father" (Matthew 18:10). Sebbie was being hugged through his angel. He was being hugged in his soul by the Lord. I could see that. And Sebbie allowed himself to be hugged.

We too are hugged by the Lord. May we allow ourselves to be delighted in by God. May we be like children.


That Man is You begins this Monday, September 20th at 7:45pm. If you are a man interested in a group that prays together and has conversation around deeper issues, please consider joining the group.

REFLECTIONS FROM OUR SEMINARIANS AND STAFF



Hello! My name is Martin Nyberg, and I am a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Chicago starting my second year of theology at Mundelein Seminary. I was born and raised on the Northwest Side of Chicago in St. Edward Parish. I'm the youngest of four kids and have attended Catholic schools my whole life. I first expressed interest in priesthood in

kindergarten after my mom showed me a picture of, then, Pope John Paul II in a Catholic newspaper and told me what a great man he was. At my kindergarten graduation, when asked what I wanted to be when I grew up, I said "The Pope."

Even though I was an altar server through high school and the priests at my home parish always encouraged me to think about the priesthood, it wasn't until later on in my college career that I began to desire this vocation and seriously consider it as an option for me. My faith life changed dramatically as an undergraduate at The Catholic University of America. Meeting students my age who took their faith seriously and wanted to grow in their relationship with Jesus made a huge impact on me. I joined a prayer group on campus where I met some of my closest friends and began to learn about the Catholic spiritual tradition. I found that the more time I set aside for prayer each day, the more interior peace and freedom I experienced, and the more effectively I was able to attend to my work and to my friendships.

I play the cello and would sometimes perform in school concerts. After one of these, an older student asked me out of the blue, "Martin, have you ever thought about being a priest?" I said that I had but didn't think it was for me. Three months later, my English professor, a priest, took me aside on the last day of class and said, "This is none of my business, but have you ever considered being a priest?" I said that I'd thought about it but wasn't sure if it was for me. Three more months passed, and after finishing a summer internship my roommate — again, out of the blue — said, "Martin, I've been watching you all summer and think you'd make a good priest. Have you ever thought about being a priest?" It was then and there that I decided to stop throwing the question under the rug and start seriously praying about it.

Even though it was difficult to consider leaving behind my hopes for a family and a career, I couldn't ignore the peace

and consolation I experienced at Mass and before the Blessed Sacrament or the growing desire I felt to spend my time praying, learning about the faith, and telling others about it. I entered seminary in 2018 and am now less than two years away from my diaconate ordination! I look forward to serving and getting to know the community here at St. Paul of the Cross! You all are in my prayers, please keep me in yours.

To be fair, we did go to Mass every Sunday, and my parents were involved in various ministries and had us help with different service opportunities. It seems to be a pattern when I talk to priests, sisters, and seminarians they often prayed together as a family whether it was the rosary, sharing blessings and giving thanks, praying at night before bed, or grace before meals. Needless to say, family prayer makes fertile ground for fruitful vocations.



Prayer for the Catholic is like breathing. It is so many things; it is sharing our lives, thoughts, feelings, and desires with God. It is begging for graces for those we love and those we don't know. Just like learning a language, it is best learned at a young age. It might be awkward the first time you close your eyes, hold hands with family, and speak to God from the heart. It starts with a desire by parents to develop and share the great gift of faith and prayer.

Families, my encouragement as your associate pastor is to pray together this week. It can bring a feeling of unity, a quiet pause that fosters peace, and make God part of our daily life beyond Sunday.





PERPETUAL EUCHARISTIC ADORATION CHAPEL

JESUS CLEARS THE PATH

On July 11th, the parish announced that work to reopen our Eucharistic Adoration Chapel by the Fall of this year was now starting. Once again, we were committing to having a perpetual chapel — one which will stay open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. This means that Jesus is never to be left alone, someone has to be in the chapel with Him every minute.

To this end, we asked for those who intended to be adorers, to commit to a weekly one-hour slot in the chapel to be with Jesus. This requires a broad outreach program to contact the parishioners and others. Our leaders and volunteers are in the process of doing this work. They stepped forward because they recognize that Eucharistic Adoration is a very unique form of prayer. It is unique and special because we commit time to visit Jesus in the chapel, silently sitting with Him, personally facing His Body and Blood in the Sacred White Host in the monstrance.

We as Catholics were given the same mission that the Apostles were given by Jesus, *“Go and teach all nations.”* This is evangelization — to not only non-Catholics but also to members of our own faith. When we give back to Jesus 1 or more of the 168 weekly hours we received from Him by visiting Him in the Adoration Chapel, it is not only an act of adoration but a seed of evangelization.

Jesus, by His death, gave us a path to salvation, but our sins and human limitations have strewn in the path obstacles we must overcome to reach Him. The act of our visit of Adoration says to Jesus, *“I need your help to clear this path and by my actions, demonstrate to all that I recognize that You are my God.”*



St. Juliana Parish would like to welcome our neighboring parishes to join our long standing Cancer Support Group. We meet the second Tuesday of the month at 7 pm in our Parish center at 7200 N. Osceola Ave, the Northwest corner of Touhy and Osceola. This month we will meet on September 14th. We are happy for all to come join us. This is a very informal group of men and women.

Some members are in remission, some in stage four, some are or were caregivers to those with debilitating illness. It's an eclectic group of all ages. We may have 5 guests or 20. It all depends on everyone's circumstances that week. We try to stagger our monthly meetings with an informational meeting one month and a get together for sharing and fun the next. In the past, we have had ear acupuncture, Reiki massage, chair yoga, art therapy, music therapy, financial information, workers rights during illness, nutritionists, strength training, and so on. We ask for a small stipend for the speakers who volunteer as they freely give their time and knowledge. This is usually \$5.00. The other months, we bring in refreshments and just relax and talk. Sometimes, as you can imagine, those meetings end up the most profound. There is no pressure to share or comment, just a relaxing evening. We have plenty of food and wine, and a great group of people who are there for you when you don't want to worry your family or feel you are imposing upon them.

We have a pizza Christmas party, where we play LEFT, RIGHT, CENTER. We have done a few field trips to have dinner out or see an entertainer or a comedy club. We also have a summer meeting in my yard in Edison Park.



BUT ONLY SAY THE WORD


Jesus met many people who were ill. These Bible passages are only a few of the accounts of Jesus' compassion for people who were suffering and how he healed them.

Read these Gospel stories with an adult, and then decide how each picture represents a healing story.



Mark 7:31-37

Matthew 9:27-31



Luke 5:17-26

Matthew 12:9-13



Jesus continues to heal us today in the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. Many parishes celebrate this sacrament with those who are ill at a special Mass on a Sunday during the year. The entire church, led by the priest, prays for God's grace and healing.

During the celebration of the sacrament, the priest lays his hands on the sick person, as Jesus did, or extends his hands over a group of people, and says a silent prayer. He also asks for the prayers of those who are gathered around the sick person. Then the priest anoints the person with the oil of the sick on the forehead and on the hands. Anointing expresses the Church's belief that God is watching over the one receiving the sacrament, and will give them strength and peace to deal with their illness.

The Anointing of the Sick also assures those who are ill that the Church cares about them and will be praying for them. Anointing has sometimes led to full healing.

The next time you are in church, ask an adult to help you find the three holy oils, and look for the oil of the sick that is used in this sacrament. The bottle might be inscribed with the initials "OS" (for "oil of the sick") or "OI" (for *oleum infirmorum*, the Latin words for "oil of the sick"). It is usually found in a place of honor with the other two holy oils, the oil of catechumens, used in baptism, and chrism, used in baptism, confirmation, and Holy Orders.
